ALUMNI AND FACULTY HONORS

- ♦ At 100 years old, **Mary Silva Cabral**, class of 1937, was crowned the Comprehensive Care Center's Flower Festival Queen and rode in the 2019 Flower Festival parade. Now at 101, Mary is the oldest living Lompoc High graduate residing in Lompoc.
- Ron Emmons, class of 1974, was recently inducted into the National Reined Cow Horse Association Hall of Fame in Texas. As mentioned in the last few Brave Talks, Ron was named top cowboy at the Snaffle Bit Futurity two different years.
- ◆ 1972 grad **Roy Howell**, a member of the Lompoc High Hall of Fame and former Major League Baseball third baseman, had his Lompoc High baseball jersey retired at the 50th reunion of the CIF champion team. Roy was drafted in the first round (4th overall) right out of high school by the Texas Rangers and went on to play 1,112 games in eleven seasons with the Toronto Blue Jays and the Milwaukee Brewers. He had a lifetime batting average of .261 and was selected for the 1978 All Star game. He is the second player at Lompoc High to have his jersey retired.
- Elmer Nelson (class of 1961), on November 6, 2018 was voted in as the mayor of Bonanza, Arkansas.
- Toa Taua is playing football for the Nevada Wolfpack. Taua ended the season with 814 yards rushing with six touchdowns on 196 carries. Taua also had 30 receptions for 185 yards. The Wolfpack has high hopes for the coming season with leading rusher Taua.
- Another Hall of Famer is Claudia Terrones. Mrs. Terrones is the athletic director and longtime girls' basketball and track & field coach at Lompoc High. She was inducted into the Northern Santa Barbara County Athletic Hall of Fame.

Super Bowl Fundraiser, which raised \$1,000 and was won by M. Pico, Britt Jones and Bob Manfrina.



LHS Alumni Association Scholarship Program

One of the main purposes of the LHSAA is to award scholarships to deserving graduating seniors and college students. Most of our fundraisers are just for this purpose. Since 1986, the Alumni Association has awarded \$54,500, and in 2007 the association began awarding scholarships to college students as well. The amount has been increased to \$1,000 each, from the original \$500.

Criteria for high school seniors:

Student must have attended Lompoc High School all four years. Also, a parent or legal guardian must be a member of the LHS Alumni Association; a one-time fee of \$30 for a lifetime membership. Membership forms to join the association can be found on the alumni website lompochighalumni.com.

High school scholarship applications can be found at Lompoc High School's website lusd.org/lhs then click on

Counseling, then Scholarships. Students can download the Common Scholarship Application and pick up additional information in the LHS Counseling Office. This year's deadline was March 20, 2020.

Criteria for current college students:

Applicant must be an LHS graduate, member of the LHS Alumni Association, currently attending a community college, four-year college or a technical school and be enrolled in at least twelve units of coursework. The college scholarship application can be found on lompochighalumni.com website.



2019 HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

Barry Manfrina and Debbie Schuyler both graduated from Lompoc High in 1961. Barry attended UCSB then enlisted in the United States Navy serving aboard the USS Hollister in the waters off Vietnam. Debbie attended Cal Poly SLO and majored in animal husbandry. Upon graduating she received a Gold Key award for her involvement in Cal Poly organizations. A year after Barry's return from Vietnam they were married, had two girls and began their many years of involvement in the girls' activities. Their 4-H roles included assistant lamb leaders, marine science leaders, backpacking, shearing sheep and hauling members and their sheep to county functions and weighing members' project lambs on a weekly basis.

Between 4-H activities, Barry worked at the Okonite Cable Company in Santa Maria for over 41 years.

Debbie gave tours to fourth graders at the Lompoc Museum nearly every week for 25 years, then switched to third graders and Lompoc history at the Historical Society. Both Debbie and Barry have served on the LHS Alumni Association for many years. They were longtime members of the Car Show committee, and later became chairpersons. Barry was on the Scholarship selection committee for many years. Debbie is a past Alumni Association president and served as Brave Talk editor for 19 years. She is also on the Historical Society Board and is a past officer. Both of Barry's parents, Walter and Myra Manfrina, and Debbie's father, Glenn Schuyler, have been inducted in the Lompoc High School Hall of Fame, so they feel it is a great honor to follow in their footsteps.

Ruth Glidden Schuyler is the first member of the Class of 1959 to be inducted into the LHSAA Hall of Fame. Ruth has devoted most of her adult life to service in this community with organizations including SB County Search and Rescue, the International Association of Rebekah Assemblies, Cub Scouts and Meals on Wheels. She and her husband Will owned and operated Schuyler's Off Road and Mower Service for 52 years.

Eddie Hawley Sissons, member of the Class of 1964, also celebrated a reunion, her class's 55th, at the 2019 Historical Society dinner. Eddie has made a career of community service. She currently works for Research Advisory Service, Inc. in Arizona, providing advocacy training for parents of individuals with mental illness for Vision of Hope Arizona. She provides a similar service to peers, families, and providers for the Arizona Foundation for Behavioral Health. She was previously the Executive Director of this latter organization and helped to launch lectures and movie series discussions on those topics to health care professionals. She was the program manager for the Office of the Arizona Attorney General as it established satellite offices around the state. Staffed by trained volunteers, these offices assisted Arizona residents with civil rights and consumer problems. She coauthored the federally mandated "Needs Assessment for Maricopa County Head Start." She was a co-convener of advocates on hunger, housing and homelessness, domestic violence, and poverty programs.

Where were you in 1970?

The year was 1970. Back then the world population was 3.63 billion, the U.S. population was 204 million, average annual income was \$7,800 per year, federal minimum wage averaged \$2.50 an hour, average cost of a new house was \$23,450, Americans renting a home spent about \$140 per month, average life expectancy of a male was 67.1 years old, average life expectancy of a female was 74.8 years old, U.S. postage stamp cost 6 cents, gas was 36 cents per gallon, the president of the U.S. was Richard Nixon, New York City was the largest urban area in the U.S. with a population of 7.9 million. Chicago (3.3 million) and Los Angeles (2.8 million) followed, voting age was lowered from 21 to 18, tuition at Harvard was \$2,400 per year, average cost of a new car was just under \$4K, and a movie ticket cost an average of \$1.50.

While all of this was happening, an event that did not make the list was held on June 1, 1970 at Anaheim Stadium. Approximately 2,500 Lompocians traveled to the stadium to watch coach Dan Bodary's Braves baseball team play in their first ever CIF Championship game against El Segundo.

The Braves' roster featured future major leaguers Roy Howell, Roy Thomas and Dave Stegman, team captain Monte Bollinger, Bobby Grossini, Robert Aguilar, Jeff Bratz, Joe Brooks, Kelly Candaele, Steve Glover, Carlos Gonzalez, Tom Harmon, Ruben Heredia, Marc Landry, Paul Ortiz, Neal Porter, Ruben Terrones, and Ted Torres. Assistant coach Jim McKaskle and managers Bruce Williams, Charles Hilley and Randy Shaw rounded out the group.

The actual CIF write up is as follows: "Lompoc High, beaten in its opening game of the season, completed a "perfect" year at Anaheim Stadium on June 1 by defeating El Segundo, 8-5, to win the CIF, SS, AAA, baseball championship in the first half of the play-offs double bill. A crowd of 4,520 witnessed the play-off games. Lompoc, twice taking advantage of a drawnin El Segundo infield, scored three runs in both the second and third innings and then received an over powering relief performance from Roy Thomas to claim its 26th straight victory. Thomas, a 6-5, junior right-hander, took over in the fifth inning after El Segundo had rallied for four runs to cut the Lompoc lead to 7-5. He retired the side on a ground out and pitched hitless ball the rest of the way, striking out four. Junior left-hander Ted Torres of the Braves was credited with his 11th victory of the season. This was the first CIF baseball championship win for Coach Dan Bodary and Lompoc High School."

In May of 2014 that team was voted the seventh best high school team of all time in California. For those that remember that day or were just told about this great team, a 50-year reunion was held for them on January 18, 2020 at the Schuyler Riverbottom Ranch. About 100 people gathered to see Roy Howell's jersey retired as well as see the retired jersey of Roy Thomas. Almost all of the team was there or represented by a family member. Stories and bantering amongst the players and families filled the day with a Santa Maria-style barbecue with a Lompoc flavor.



In Memoriam-Gunther Cunningham

Gunther Cunningham, moved to Lompoc from Munich

Germany. His English was limited as he spoke mainly German. Bob Manfrina was one of his early friends and it was Bob who convinced Gunther to go out for football. He graduated from Lompoc High in 1965. There he played football and he also played for Hancock College. He earned a scholarship to play at the University of Oregon. There is where he began his coaching career.

He was the defensive line coach for the University of Oregon and from there his coaching career spanned nearly five decades-coaching in college, NFL, and the Canadian Football League.

Next he was the defensive line coach for the JV team at Stanford, then coached as the defensive coordinator until 1980. In 1982, after a couple of seasons coaching in Canada, his first job with the NFL was with the Baltimore Colts. He coached the defensive line/linebackers. He went on to coach with the San Diego Chargers and the Los Angeles Raiders

for a few years. He then was the Kansas City Chiefs defensive coordinator and was their head coach from 1999 to 2000. Detroit was his final coaching stop where he spent 5 seasons as the team's defensive coordinator before moving into a senior coaching assistant job from 2014 to 2016.

Gunther died in May leaving a wife and two children. "Gunther Cunningham will forever be remembered as one of the great men of our game" the Lions spokesman said in a statement. "He left a lasting impact on every person who was fortunate to work alongside him during his more that 47 years as a coach "




